## MESSAGES FROM THE PUBLIC MESSAGES FROM APPOINTED OFFICIALS

**Item One:** Ms. Judy Freeman, Zoning Administrator, regarding the information received on the status of the burn permit issued by KDHE for Mr. Scholes' property. Ms. Freeman gave the Commissioners an email from Mr. Jim Emerson, County Counselor, which summarized his discussion with Mr. Doug Cole from KDHE in Chanute. There was some disagreement over the meaning of some of the points on the email from Mr. Jim Emerson. The Commissioners felt that they need to discuss this information with Mr. Emerson to be sure they understand it correctly.

Mr. Scholes was present and stated that he has not burned at this site for over 8 years and that he has this open to keep the brush from being dumped along the side of county roads. There were representatives from a couple of local tree trimming services that stated that without this location to dispose of this brush, they will have to increase the amount for their services if they have to haul it to the landfill near Arcadia and then they have to pay a dump fee. The Commissioners wanted to find a way to work with these parties to find a place for them to dispose of this brush. The tree trimmers stated that the cities in the county have brush disposal sites that they can use only if they are working for the city. There was a discussion of how they can still use this site but also keep the road in good shape.

Judy,

I visited with Doug Cole this morning concerning the burn permit issued to Bill Scholes. The discussion is summarized as follows:

1. The permit Mr. Scholes had was not just for his use but could be used by other parties as well.
2. The County can request that KDHE issue a burn permit for Mr. Scholes only. This way no zoning would be needed.
3. If Mr. Scholes wishes to continue to allow other parties to bring items to his site, he must obtain a conditional use to do so.

It will be up to Mr. Scholes to determine how he wishes to proceed.

**Item Two:** Mr. Eldon Bedene, Emergency Management Director, regarding the transfer or disposal of property that has been received through FEMA or Homeland Security Grants. Mr. Bedene gave the Commissioners some information on the options available to the county when they need to dispose of some of this equipment. Mr. Bedene also gave the Commissioners some sample resolutions to use to set up Mutual Aid agreements with cities and counties in the area. He added that FEMA will require these agreements to be set up and approved prior to a disaster in order to receive reimbursement for work done in neighboring cities or counties as the result of a disaster. It was also discussed that the state might start billing municipalities for services performed by the National Guard at the request of the municipality if a disaster is not proclaimed. Mr. Bedene

wanted the Commissioners to review these forms and they can discuss them with County Counselor Jim Emerson at a later date. Mr. Bedene also discussed how equipment can be used to help with disasters in other counties and how other counties equipment can be used to help with a disaster in Crawford County.

RESOLUTION NO. 2002-132

A RESOLUTION ESTABLISHING A POLICY OF CRAWFORD COUNTY  
KANSAS TO PROVIDE ASSISTANCE TO OTHER COUNTIES, CITIES AND  
TOWNSHIPS DURING DISASTERS; PURSUANT TO K.S.A. 12-16-117.

WHEREAS, the County of Crawford has facilities, equipment, and  
Personnel capable of providing assistance in the event of disaster; and

WHEREAS, the County of Crawford to render assistance that may be  
appropriate to other counties, cities and townships in the event of disaster;

NOW, THEREFORE, BE IT RESOLVED by the Board of County  
Commissioners of the County of Crawford, meeting in regular session on this  
11 day of June, 2002, as follows:

1. That in the event of a disaster, if there is a request for assistance by  
another county, city or township, within or without the state of Kansas, and if Crawford  
County, Kansas can provide assistance without unduly jeopardizing the protection of its  
own community, that this resolution hereby authorizes providing, under the authority of  
K.S.A. 12-16, 117 with all privileges and immunities provided therein, such assistance  
as may be required.

2. This resolution authorizes, in the event of a disaster, the Chairman of the  
Board of County Commissioners or his/her designee to immediately render such  
assistance as may be required, provided that, as soon as practical the Board of County  
Commissioners shall meet and shall vote upon any continuing or additional assistance,  
and provided further that no actions by the Chairman of the Board of County  
Commissioners or his/her designee, or by the Board of County Commissioners, shall

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
conflict with any local or interjurisdictional disaster plan adopted by Sample County pursuant to K.S.A. 48-901 et seq. and amendments thereto.


3. Nothing in this resolution is intended to conflict with or circumvent any existing interlocal agreement, and automatic aid, intergovernmental or mutual aid agreement, or any authority of Crawford County to enter into any such agreement in the future.

4. It is the intent of this resolution to authorize providing assistance in any form, including, but no limited to, police, fire, emergency management services, public works, administrative and clerical up on the occurrence of the imminent threat of widespread or severe damage, injury or loss of lives or property resulting from any natural or man-made cause, including but not limited to, fire, flood, earthquake, wind, storm, epidemics, air contamination, blight, drought, infestation, explosion or riot.

### MESSAGES FROM ELECTED OFFICIAL MESSAGES FROM OTHER GOVERNMENTAL ENTITIES

**Item One:** Ms. Becky Gray, SEK-CAP, discussing Community Assessment. Ms. Gray discussed the summary of the responses that were received to an online survey of community leaders in the SEK area. The survey tried to identify areas of concern for the respondents in categories such as Community Planning Issues, Health Issues and Employment Issues. There was a discussion of housing issues in the area and that the SEK-CAP weatherization program is now addressing issues on more rented homes than on individually owned homes. Ms. Gray asked the Commissioners about the concerns that they have for the area and most of the concerns were about economic development,

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workforce training and affordable housing. There was a discussion of technical training and workforce development and that it would be beneficial to conduct a survey that assessed the skill levels of the local workforce. Ms. Gray stated that she would send the commissioners the final results of the survey they are conducting.




Commission Responses: No Commissioners responded to the survey.

#### Barriers to Employment


1. access to living wage jobs

Dear Mr. Pyle,

As your constituent, I am writing on behalf of the Pancreatic Cancer Action Network and the estimated 39,590 Americans who will die of pancreatic cancer in 2014, approximately 370 of whom live in Kansas. In 2014, pancreatic cancer will afflict more than 46,420 Americans, 73% of whom will die within one year of their diagnosis, and 94% of whom will die within five years of diagnosis.

During the summer of 2007 my grandfather, Philip LaMonica, noticed a strange pain in his side. Several tests were run and his doctor could not explain the nagging ache. My grandfather was active and enthusiastic; he wasn't going to let a little side pain bring him down. He continued to golf, play tennis, boat, ski, and enjoy life as usual. Unfortunately, the pain went undiagnosed for too long. After a couple months, a new symptom developed - he became jaundice. A test was ordered by his doctor to look at his pancreas. The test results were shocking and a day I will never forget. My grandfather was diagnosed with Stage IV pancreatic cancer and passed away two years later. I often ask myself if he would be alive today if he had been diagnosed sooner.

As a member of the Pancreatic Cancer Action Network, I devote my time to raising awareness and will continue to advocate for early detection so others will have some hope including my Aunt's father who was diagnosed with pancreatic cancer last year. After meeting others at events to raise awareness, I continue to hear the same story over and over again and this needs to change.

My grandpa was a huge part of my life. He attended a majority of my extra-curricular activities from piano recitals to soccer games. He didn't survive long enough to see my varsity soccer team win regionals, see me graduate from high school or help at move-in day here at Pittsburg State. All life moments I know he would have wanted to be a part.

To date, pancreatic cancer is the fourth leading cause of cancer death in the United States, and it is the only major cancer with a five-year relative survival rate in the single digits at just six percent. Furthermore, the incidence and death rate for pancreatic cancer are increasing, and pancreatic cancer is anticipated to move from the fourth to the second leading cause of cancer-related death in the U.S. by 2020. We need your help to shine a spotlight on this disease and finally make progress in developing treatments and early detection tools. By issuing a proclamation supporting the

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observance of November 2014 as Pancreatic Cancer Awareness Month in Crawford County, you can help us to raise awareness in our community.

I have attached a draft of the proclamation text for your review. I am happy to provide additional official Pancreatic Cancer Action Network material, including pancreatic cancer facts and statistics and NCI funding information, upon request.
