UNDER THE HEADING NEW BUSINESS PUBLIC HEARINGS AND OPENING OF ANNOUNCED BIDS MESSAGES FROM THE COUNTY LOCAL BOARD OF HEALTH MESSAGES FROM APPOINTED OFFICIALS

Item One: Ms. Rebecca Adamson, County Health Officer presenting the Kansas Department of Health & Environment Contract for Ongoing Implementation of the 1422 Grant in Crawford County. Ms. Adamson stated this is the Health Department's 4th year for this grant. She explained that this is a CDC grant in which CDC gives funds to KDHE and KDHE distributes those funds to 6 communities in the State of Kansas. She said that the Health Department is very lucky to be one of the 6 communities to receive this grant. Ms. Adamson stated that this is a \$240,000 per year grant with no match needed. She also explained the 15 different objectives for this grant. She said that this is the 4th and final year for this grant and KDHE does not know if it will be offered again. Ms. Adamson explained the employees involved in the program and the wages that are paid for out of the grant money. She stated that this grant money has done something for every community in Crawford County.

KANSAS DEPARTMENT OF HEALTH AND ENVIRONMENT CONTRACT FOR

ONGOING IMPLEMENTATION OF THE 1422 GRANT IN CRAWFORD COUNTY

- 1. Parties to Contract
 - 1.1. Kansas Department of Health and Environment [KDHE]
 - 1.2. Crawford County Health Department, 410 E. Atkinson, Suite A, Pittsburg, KS 66762 [CCHD]

The Parties agree to the following terms and conditions:

- Purpose of Contract The purpose of this Contract is to support implementation of the State and Local Public Health Actions to Prevent Obesity, Diabetes, and Heart Disease and Stroke (DP14-1422PPHF14) (1422) grant that will address population-wide and priority population approaches to prevent obesity, diabetes, heart disease and stroke, and reduce health disparities in these areas among adults.
- 3. Term of Contract The period of this Contract shall be September 30, 2017 through September 29, 2018.
- 4. Duties of CCHD
 - 4.1. Conduct work in accordance with the approved itemized budget (Appendix D).
 - 4.2. Submit affidavits of expenditure within thirty (30) days of the end of the quarter in accordance with the Payment and Affidavit table (Appendix C).
 - 4.3. Assign 1.0 FTE staff member as the project manager/coordinator to coordinate the day to day operations of the 1422 local project and serve as a liaison to KDHE.
 - 4.4. Continue to work with the convened 1422 local implementation team to guide implementation of 1422 activities as determined by the approved CCHD work plan and in accordance with the Dual Approach Framework and synergistic approach, and KDHE 1422 Guidance Document.
 - 4.5. Participate in the 1422 Community of Practice and Webinar series facilitated by the Wichita State University Center for Community Engagement Institute (CEI).
 - 4.6. Attend all required conference calls, webinars and in person trainings and meetings associated with planning and implementing the 1422 grant, including project coordination calls scheduled and facilitated by KDHE.
 - 4.7. Coordinate local working teams and/or subcontract with local and state entities as needed to assure completion of activities for each of the 15 strategies under the 1422 grant components in accordance with the Dual Approach Framework and Synergistic Approach.
 - 4.8. Respond to 1422 inquiries from local partners, KDHE, and KDHE contractors within three business days or sooner as required by KDHE.
 - 4.9. Develop a minimum of one, written local 1422 dual approach success story and one, video local 1422 dual approach success story that incorporates strategies across components and highlights outcomes of the 1422 project in the community, specifically how it has addressed the 1422 strategies for underserved target populations.
 - 4.10. Complete progress reporting once monthly in Catalyst for every activity in the approved CCHD work plan and write progress according to guidance provided in the 1422 Grantee Guidance Document.

- 4.10.1. Submit progress by email to KDHE three full business days in advance of a Project Coordination Call, as instructed in the 1422 Grantee Guidance Document.
- 4.11. Complete mid-year progress reporting at the strategy level for each 1422 strategy in Catalyst by March 30, 2018, and complete end-of-year progress reporting at the strategy level for each 1422 strategy in Catalyst by September 28, 2018.
- 4.12. Track performance measures using the Component 1 and Component 2 performance measure tracking logs and submit both tracking logs to KDHE twice annually, once by March 30, 2018, and once by September 28, 2018.
- 4.13. Prepare for and host an annual, in-person site visit with KDHE staff, in accordance with instructions sent by KDHE, to be completed as scheduled by KDHE sometime between February 1 and May 31, 2018.
- 5. Duties of KDHE -
 - 5.1. Provide oversight for all aspects of the federal 1422 grant.
 - 5.2. Coordinate and oversee a team of KDHE facilitators, key contacts and content experts, as well as state contractors, to provide training and technical support for local 1422 planning and implementation efforts.
 - 5.3. Provide timely guidance, technical support and feedback on all 1422 related work products and inquiries.
 - 5.4. Schedule and host Project Coordination Calls with CCHD.
 - 5.5. Schedule and send instructions for the annual site visit to CCHD at least 30 days in advance of the scheduled site visit.
 - 5.6. Plan quarterly in-person meetings between KDHE staff, all 1422 community teams, and relevant KDHE contractors, with annual site visits counting toward the second quarter meeting.
- 6. Compensation -
 - 6.1. KDHE shall make an initial payment of \$60,000 upon execution of this contract and approval of the Year 3 Quarter 4 affidavit of expenditure that is due on or before Oct. 13, 2017.
 - 6.2. Subsequent payments shall be based upon:
 - 6.2.1. Receipt and approval of an affidavit of expenditure and according to the attached payment schedule (Appendix C). Affidavit of expenditures must be submitted for approval to KDHE for all funds received.
 - 6.2.2. Completion of required duties each quarter as outlined in this contract and the checklist of requirements in the 1422 Grantee Guidance Document. Payment may be withheld by KDHE until requirements are met.
 - 6.3. The Contract amount shall not exceed \$240,000.
- 7. Miscellaneous Terms and Conditions -
 - 7.1. This Contract is contingent upon the availability of state or federal funds and may be terminated by thirty (30) day advance written notice by KDHE.
 - 7.2. Binding Appendices. The provisions found in Appendix A, (Contractual Provisions Attachment [Form DA-146a]) and Appendix B, (Whistleblower and Non-Debarment Certification) are hereby incorporated in this Contract and made a part hereof. Such provisions shall take precedence over any contrary provisions of this Contract.

- 7.3. Amendments. This Contract may be amended as necessary if such amendment is in writing and executed by the Parties with the same formalities as this Contract.
- 7.4. Termination. This Contract may be terminated by either Party upon providing written notice to the other party at least thirty (30) days in advance of the effective date of termination. If this Contract is terminated, CCHD will be paid for those fees earned and costs incurred prior to the date of termination. KDHE shall receive all materials and products produced prior to the date of termination.
- 7.5. Prostitution and Sex Trafficking. None of the funds made available under this agreement may be used to promote or advocate the legalization or practice of prostitution or sex trafficking. Nothing in the preceding sentence shall be construed to preclude the provision to individuals of palliative care, treatment, or post-exposure pharmaceutical prophylaxis, and necessary pharmaceuticals and commodities, including test kits, condoms, and, when proven effective, microbicides.
 - 7.5.1. "Commercial sex act" means any sex act on account of which anything of value is given to or received by any person.
 - 7.5.2. "Prostitution" means procuring or providing any commercial sex act and the "practice of prostitution" has the same meaning.
 - 7.5.3. "Sex trafficking" means the recruitment, harboring, transportation, provision, or obtaining of a person for the purpose of a commercial sex act. 22 U.S.C. § 7102(9).

CONTRACTUAL PROVISIONS ATTACHMENT

Important: This form contains mandatory contract provisions and must be attached to or incorporated in all copies of any contractual agreement. If it is attached to the vendor/contractor's standard contract form, then that form must be altered to contain the following provision:

"The Provisions found in Contractual Provisions Attachment (Form DA-146a, Rev. 06-12), which is attached hereto, are hereby incorporated in this contract and made a part thereof.

The parties agree that the following provisions are hereby incorporated into the contract to which it is attached and made a part thereof, said contract being the _____ day of _____, 20____, 20____.

1. <u>Terms Herein Controlling Provisions</u>: It is expressly agreed that the terms of each and every provision in this attachment shall prevail and control over the terms of any other conflicting provision in any other document relating to and a part of the contract in which this attachment is incorporated. Any terms that conflict or could be interpreted to conflict with this attachment are nullified.

2. Kansas Law and Venue: This contract shall be subject to, governed by, and construed according to the laws of the State of Kansas, and jurisdiction and venue of any suit in connection with this contract shall reside only in courts located in the State of Kansas.

3. <u>Termination Due To Lack Of Funding Appropriation</u>: If, in the judgment of the Director of Accounts and Reports, Department of Administration, sufficient funds are not appropriated to continue the function performed in this agreement and for the payment of the charges-hereunder, State may terminate this agreement at the end of its current fiscal year. State agrees to give written notice of termination to contractor at least 30 days prior to the end of its current fiscal year, and shall give such notice for a greater period prior to the end of such fiscal year, and shall give such notice for a greater period prior to the end of such fiscal year as may be provided in this contract, except that such notice shall not be required prior to 90 days before the end of such fiscal year. Contractor all negular contractual payments incurred through the end of such fiscal year, not such endipment. Upon termination of the agreement by State, title to any such equipment shall revert to contractor at the end of the State's current fiscal year. The termination of the contract pursuant to this paragraph shall not cause any penalty to be charged to the agency or the contractor.

4. <u>Disclaimer Of Liability</u>: No provision of this contract will be given effect that attempts to require the State of Kansas or its agencies to defend, hold harmless, or indemnify any contractor or third party for any acts or omissions. The liability of the State of Kansas is defined under the Kansas Tort Claims Act (K.S.A. 75-6101 et seq.).

5. <u>Anti-Discrimination Clause</u>: The contractor agrees: (a) to comply with the Kansas Act Against Discrimination (K.S.A. 44-1001 <u>et seq.</u>) and the Asnasa Age Discrimination in Employment Act (K.S.A. 44-1111 <u>et seq.</u>) and the applicable provisions of the Americans With Disabilities Act (42 U.S.C. 12101 <u>et seq.</u>) (ADA) and to not discriminate against any person because of race, religion, color, sex, disability, national origin or ancestry, or age in the admission or access to, or treatment or employment in, its programs or activities; (b) to include in all solicitations or advertisements for employees, the phrase "equal opportunity employer"; (c) to comply with the reporting requirements set out at K.S.A. 44-1031 and K.S.A. 44-1116; (d) to include they are binding upon such subcontractor or vendor; (e) that a failure to comply with the reporting requirements of (c) above or if the contractor is found guilly of any violation of susch acts by the Kansas Human Rights Commission, such violation shall constitute a breach of contract and the contract may be cancelled, terminated or suspended, in whole or in part, by the contracting stale agency or the Kansas Department of Administration; (f) if it is determined that the contractor has violated applicable provisions of ADA, such violation shall constitute a breach of contract may be cancelled, terminated or suspended, in whole or in part, by the contracting stale agency or the Kansas Department of Administration; Department of Administration

Contractor agrees to comply with all applicable state and federal anti-discrimination laws. The provisions of this paragraph number 5 (with the exception of those provisions relating to the ADA) are not applicable to a contractor who employs fewer than four employees during the term of such contract or whose contracts with the contracting State agency cumulatively total \$5,000 or less during the fiscal year of such agency.

6. <u>Acceptance Of Contract</u>: This contract shall not be considered accepted, approved or otherwise effective until the statutorily required approvals and certifications have been given.

7. <u>Arbitration, Damages, Warranties</u>: Notwithstanding any language to the contrary, no interpretation of this contract shall find that the State or its agencies have agreed to binding arbitration, or the payment of damages or penalties. Further, the State of Kansas and its agencies do not agree to pay altorney fees, costs, or late payment charges beyond those available under the Kansas Prompt Payment Act (K.S.A. 75-6403), and no provision will be given effect that attempts to exclude, modify, disclaim or or therwise attempt to limit any damages available to the State of Kansas or its agencies at law, including but not limited to the implied warranties of merchantability and fitness for a particular purpose.

8. <u>Representative's Authority To Contract</u>: By signing this contract, the representative of the contractor thereby represents that such person is duly authorized by the contractor to execute this contract on behalf of the contractor and that the contractor agrees to be bound by the provisions thereof.

9. <u>Responsibility For Taxes</u>: The State of Kansas and its agencies shall not be responsible for, nor indemnify a contractor for, any federal, state or local taxes which may be imposed or levied upon the subject matter of this contract.

10. <u>Insurance</u>: The State of Kansas and its agencies shall not be required to purchase any insurance against loss or damage to property or any other subject matter relating to this contract, nor shall this contract require them to establish a "self-insurance" fund to protect against any such loss or damage. Subject to the provisions of the Kansas Tort Claims Act (K.S.A. 75-6101 <u>et sea.</u>), the contractor shall bear the risk of any loss or damage to any property in which the contractor holds title.

11. <u>Information</u>: No provision of this contract shall be construed as limiting the Legislative Division of Post Audit from having access to information pursuant to K.S.A. 46-1101 et seq.

12. <u>The Eleventh Amendment:</u> "The Eleventh Amendment is an inherent and incumbent protection with the State of Kansas and need not be reserved, but prudence requires the State to reiterate that nothing related to this contract shall be deemed a waiver of the Eleventh Amendment."

Campaign Contributions / Lobbving: Funds provided through a grant award or contract shall not be given or received in exchange for the making of a campaign contribution. No part of the funds provided through this contract shall be used to influence or attempt to influence an officer or employee of any State of Kansas agency or a member of the Legislature regarding any pending legislation or the awarding, extension, continuation, renewal, amendment or modification of any government contract, grant, loan, or cooperative agreement.

APPENDIX B COMPLIANCE WITH THE "PILOT PROGRAM FOR ENHANCEMENT OF CONTRACTOR EMPLOYEE WHISTLEBLOWER PROTECTIONS"

Congress has enacted a law, found at 41 U.S.C. 4712, encouraging employees to report fraud, waste, and abuse. This law applies to all employees working for contractors, grantees, subcontractors and subgrantees on federal grants and contracts [for the purpose of this document, "Recipient of Funds"]. The National Defense Authorization Act (NDAA) for Fiscal Year 2013 (Pub. L. 112-239, enacted January 2, 2013) mandated a pilot program entitled, "PILOT PROGRAM FOR ENHANCEMENT OF CONTRACTOR EMPLOYEE WHISTLEBLOWER PROTECTIONS". 41 U.S.C. 4712 has been amended, enacting a permanent extension of the pilot program.

This program requires all grantees, their subgrantees and subcontractors to:

- Inform their employees working on any Federal award they are subject to the whistleblower rights and remedies of the pilot program;
- Inform their employees in writing of employee whistleblower protections under 41 U.S.C. 4712 in the predominant native language of the workforce; and,
- Contractors and grantees will include such requirements in any agreement made with a subcontractor or subgrantee.

Employees of a contractor, subcontractor, grantee [or subgrantee] may not be discharged, demoted, or otherwise discriminated against as reprisal for "whistleblowing." In addition, whistleblower protections cannot be waived by any agreement, policy, form or condition of employment.

Whistleblowing is defined as making a disclosure "that the employee reasonably believes is evidence of any of the following:

- Gross mismanagement of a federal contract or grant;
- A gross waste of federal funds;
- An abuse of authority relating to a federal contract or grant;
- A substantial and specific danger to public health or safety; or,
- A violation of law, rule, or regulation related to a federal contract or grant (including the competition for, or negotiation of, a contract or grant).

To qualify under the statute, the employee's disclosure must be made to:

- A Member of Congress or a representative of a Congressional committee;
- An Inspector General;
- The Government Accountability Office;
- A federal employee responsible for contract or grant oversight or management at the relevant agency;
- An official from the Department of Justice, or other law enforcement agency;
- A court or grand jury; or,
- A management official or other employee of the contractor, subcontractor, grantee, or subgrantee who has the responsibility to investigate, discover, or address misconduct.

The Recipient of Funds acknowledges that as a condition of receiving funds, it has complied with the terms of the "PILOT PROGRAM FOR ENHANCEMENT OF CONTRACTOR EMPLOYEE WHISTLEBLOWER PROTECTIONS", as amended, and has informed its employees in writing and in the predominant native language of the workforce, that by working on any Federal award, the employees are subject to the whistleblower rights and remedies.

NON-DEBARMENT CERTIFICATION AND WARRANTY

The Recipient of Funds acknowledges that KDHE is required to verify that any person or entity receiving funds has not been suspended, debarred or otherwise excluded from receiving federal funds. Verification may be accomplished by 1) checking the System for Award Management (SAM) at <u>www.sam.gov</u>; 2) obtaining a certification from the entity; or 3) by adding a clause or condition to the transaction.

The Recipient of Funds, as a condition of receiving funds, certifies and warrants that neither it nor its principals are presently debarred, suspended, proposed for debarment, declared ineligible, or voluntarily excluded from participation in this transaction by any Federal department or agency, or by any department or agency of the State of Kansas.

Item Two: Mr. Pyle stated that he spoke to Ryan Insurance and they would like to attend a meeting to go over the loss runs through September when it is available. Mr. Pyle also stated that Ryan Insurance would like to set up a work session in December before they turn in bids for property, casualty and work comp insurance in January to make sure everything is understood.
